

Leader
Leads a high card in a suit

Partner
High-like suit, lead again
Low, switch

Leader
Leads the suit again

Partner, if he doesn't take the trick
Highest remaining card in suit that won't give up a trick: entry in a higher suit
Lower card in that suit: has an entry in a lower suit.

Leader
Leads a low card in a suit.

If dummy doesn't jump up, then Partner has to play high, don't take a signal from this.

Declarer takes.

Declarer leads a different suit.
Leader/partner both play high (without giving up a trick) if they like the Leader's suit.

Declarer leads his suit a second time
Leader/partner signal high/low for the other two suits. (if they have 3 of the declarer's suit)

Leader
Leads a card in a suit.

Dummy covers.

If Partner overtakes, that isn't a signal.
Otherwise, Partner plays high/like low/dislike the opening suit.

When dummy plays, Partner may cover dummy's honor, that isn't a signal. Otherwise, partner has already signaled about the leader's suit, so he shows his side suit feature, low for lower suit, high for higher suit.

Leader, however, hasn't signaled yet about his suit, so he signals high to say his original suit is good, low to say it's crap don't lead it.

Then when the declarer leads that suit again, the Leader can do high/low to say higher/lower suit (if he has three in the declarer's suit)

Trump suit echo is basically the same, only the "declarer's suit" is always trump.

Key points:

Never give up a trick to make a signal.

If partner "likes" a suit, keep leading it until you're out of it.

Some cards may look like a signal but aren't...don't abandon common sense Keep point count in mind. If there are only 4 points in the deck for partner to have, and he needs to have AK to make leading that suit a good idea, don't do it.
